# Examining the state of mixed movement data and research along the Southern Route

The Danish Refugee Council's (DRC) Mixed Migration Centre (MMC) for Eastern and Southern Africa, the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) Regional Bureau for Southern Africa, and the International Organization for Migration's (IOM) Regional Office for Southern Africa and Regional Data Hub for East and the Horn of Africa are organizing a research event focusing on the latest mixed movement trends and developments along the Southern Route. The event will kick off with presentations on new research from MMC and IOM in collaboration with UNHCR. Participants will then take part in a facilitated discussion, reflecting on the state of mixed movement data and research along the Southern Route, and on key research priorities and gaps.
