

- Dangerous alternative means of escape (smugglers and traffickers)
- Serious protection risks (theft, bribery, physical and sexual abuse, forced marriage and child recruitment.
- Lack of **access to justice** for survivors of various forms of abuse.






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### The Impact on Routes

- The **Central Mediterranean route**, leads from Ethiopia, Somalia, and Eritrea (as Countries of Origin), converging through Sudan for onward movement towards the Mediterranean (through Egypt, Libya, etc).
- The **Eastern Route** that runs from the Horn of Africa to the Arabian Peninsula.
- The **Southern route** has the Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, and Somalia as countries of origin leading to South Africa.
